



#### **Financial Stewardship**

Financial stewardship and accountability are priorities of the Tuscarawas County Health Department (TCHD), and we are grateful for the 24.8% of our 2021 revenue that was provided through levy funding. At the end of 2021, TCHD had a workforce of 54 public health professionals including 43 full-time staff and 11 part-time staff.
























## **Preventing the Spread of Disease**

## **Protecting the Environment**

#### **Environmental Health Services**

The Tuscarawas County Health Department works behind the scenes to protect the environment. Public health sanitarians inspect restaurants, grocery stores, campgrounds, tattoo and piercing establishments, and swimming pools. Sanitarians permit drinking water wells, septic systems, and solid waste landfills. They also work to correct nuisance situations that are reported by the public.



#### **Food Safety**

The Food Safety program licenses and regulates all food service operations and retail food establishments including restaurants, grocery stores, mobile, temporary, and vending machine operations to assure that all comply with applicable laws.

#### Water Safety (Well and Septic)

Point of Sale Inspections of well and septic systems are completed by health department sanitarians. Evaluations of new and replacement home sewage treatment systems are completed by water quality sanitarians.

#### **Camps, RV and Recreation Parks**


The goal of this program is to reduce potential risk for the spread of communicable disease as



well as injuries and assure that parks and camps are maintained in compliance with laws and rules through inspections.

#### Pools, Spas, Beaches

Inspected to minimize safety hazards, reduce potential risk for disease transmission and assure that waters are in compliance with ordinances.





#### **WIC Program**

WIC is a special supplemental nutrition program for Women, Infants, and Children (WIC). The program helps income-eligible pregnant and breastfeeding women as well as infants and children up to five years of age who are at risk for health problems due to inadequate nutrition.

## **Preventing Overdose with Project DAWN**


(Deaths Avoided With Naloxone)



Project DAWN is a community-wide naloxone (also known as Narcan) distribution program that provides free Narcan kits and education for those who struggle with addiction and any community member who wants to help save lives by reversing overdoses. Training topics include how to recognize the signs and symptoms of a drug overdose and how to use naloxone to quickly reverse an overdose caused by an opioid drug.

In 2021, TCHD distributed 461 (215 in 2020) naloxone kits to the community with 41 (31 in 2020) known successful reversals.

# Safe Communities STAY ALIVE: don't TXT & drive Fata Traff SCREARS

During 2021, the State Highway Patrol reported a total of 2,355 vehicle crashes investigated in Tuscarawas County. Of these crashes, Tuscarawas County experienced 11 fatal crashes with 13 crash fatalities. Of the passenger vehicle occupants killed in Tuscarawas County crashes during 2021, 78% were not buckled at the time of the crash and 64% of the total fatal crashes involved some type of impairment (drugs and/or alcohol). Additional fatal crash variables included mature drivers (55%), youthful drivers (45%), and speed (45%). In 2020, Tuscarawas County experienced a


total of 11 fatal crashes with 14 fatalities.

Funded through a grant from the Ohio Traffic Safety Office, the Safe Communities Coalition of Tuscarawas County works with community partners to promote traffic safety messages to aide in the prevention of vehicle accidents.

Safety messages include Click It or Ticket; Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over; Look Out for Motorcycles; and Stay Alive, Don't Text & Drive.
