

Please continue to follow the CDC tips below to reduce the spread of COVID-19 in our community:

- Clean your hands often with soap and water for 20 seconds especially after you have been in a public place, or after blowing your nose, coughing, or sneezing
- If soap and water are not readily available, use a hand sanitizer that contains at least 60% alcohol. Cover all surfaces of your hands and rub them together until they feel dry.
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth with unwashed hands.
- Avoid close contact with people who are sick, even inside your home.
- Put distance between yourself and other people outside of your home (at least 6 feet).
- Cover your mouth and nose with a cloth face cover when around others.
- Cover your cough or sneeze with a tissue, throw the tissue in the trash, then immediately wash your hands.
- Clean and disinfect frequently touched objects and surfaces daily.

HAVING A DIFFICULT TIME FINDING CLEANING SOLUTION?

HERE ARE 5 WAYS TO CLEAN AND DISINFECT WHEN EVERYDAY SUPPLIES RUN OUT.

- Clean with soap and water to remove as much debris and germs as possible before disinfecting.
- Use a diluted household bleach solution if appropriate for the surface: 5 tablespoons (1/3 cup) bleach per gallon of water; or 4 teaspoons of bleach per quart of water. ***NEVER** mix bleach with ammonia or other household cleaners.
- Use an alcohol solution with at least 70% alcohol.
- Use household (3%) hydrogen peroxide. Pour undiluted hydrogen peroxide into a spray bottle and spray it on the surface to be cleaned. Let it sit on the surface for at least 1 minute. *Hydrogen Peroxide can discolor fabrics, so this is best used on hard surfaces while being careful not to get it on good clothing.
- Wear disposable gloves when cleaning and disinfecting surfaces. Discard gloves after use, or, if using reusable gloves, they should be dedicated only for cleaning and disinfecting surfaces for COVID-19 and no other purposes. Clean hands immediately after gloves are removed.
